The **purpose** of this study was to assess rates of gambling participation and problem gambling in the Republic of Cyprus using internationally comparable methods



The **results** of this study enhance our understanding of gambling harms in Cyprus, and serve as a foundation from which to build a public health approach to addressing gambling harms



We collected information about people's gambling participation and harms from gambling


Data collected by Insights Market Research (IMR) Ltd via Computer Assisted Telephone Interviews in November and December 2022








We also performed a systematic search of comparable studies conducted internationally between January 1st, 2019 and March 6th, 2021



Results of systematic search

Ten studies met the inclusion criteria of the systematic search. Of these 10 studies, five used similar methods and were directly comparable to the current results.

These studies were from:












How many people gamble?



In 2022, **55.3%** of people living in Cyprus reported gambling in the past year


This means that approximately **359 197** adults living in Cyprus gambled in the past year (based on 2011 Cyprus census population)

This is comparable to recent international estimates













Who gambles?

Among the **55.3%**, who gamble they were most likely to be:





Among people who gambled in the past year, 73.5% gambled at least once per month




What do they gamble on?

Most popular types of gambling among people in Cyprus:

Lottery gambling was also the most popular across jurisdictions






Australian lotteries, raffles or sweeps

Online vs. in-person gambling

Online gambling has been linked to **greater** risks of harm



Among gamblers in Cyprus, 14.1% gambled online in the past year

This represents **50 647** people living in Cyprus

The most popular online gambling activity was sports betting, with 11.7% of all gamblers in Cyprus engaging in online sports betting


This represents **41 995** people living in Cyprus








We identified problem and high-risk gambling using the **Problem Gambling Severity Index (PGSI),** an internationally recognized and validated problem gambling instrument




Prevalence and International Comparisons

Historically, problem gambling prevalence rates have been found to range between 0.4 – 8.1% (Williams et al., 2012).



Note, the study from France reports problem gambling as percentage of all gamblers, rather than including those who did and did not gamble. Therefore, estimates are higher.







High-risk gamblers are most likely to be





This consistent with international literature indicating young men are at highest risk of gambling harm






Substance use

Compared to non-problem gamblers, high-risk gamblers were more likely to report


- Tobacco use
- Binge drinking




Mental Health

Compared to non-problem gamblers, high-risk gamblers were more likely to report

- being less happy
- serious mental health issues



Gambling risk by type of gambling



Gambling risk by type of gambling

Among **high-risk** gamblers, the most popular types of gambling were:

- Sports betting or betting on other events (75.3%)
- Lottery (72.0%)
- Fruit/slot machines (33.3%)


Among **non-problem** gamblers, the most popular types of gambling were:

- Lottery (92.3%)
- Bingo (12.6%)
- Sports betting (33.3%)

Gambling risk by online vs. in-person gambling

Only **7.9%** of **non-problem** gamblers gambled online in the past year

In contrast 61.7% of high-risk gamblers gambled online in the past year





Summary and implications

Summary

In 2022, just over half of the Cyprus population (55.3%) reported gambling in the past year

most popular gambling type was lottery (49.5%) followed by sports betting (10.2%) and then bingo (7.4%).

1.5% of people living in Cyprus met the criteria for problem gambling.

People at higher risk of gambling harm were overwhelmingly male, younger (18-34), and more likely to gamble online

The most popular form of gambling among those at higher risk of gambling harm was sports betting (vs lottery among non-problem gamblers)

Summary and implications

Summary

In total, 2.6% of people living in Cyprus are high risk gamblers. They were more likely to:



Be 18 to 34 years old



Be Male



Gamble to escape or distract themselves



Smoke tobacco and binge drink alcohol



Be less happy, and report serious mental health issues High risk gamblers were also more likely to participate in:



Online gambling



Sports betting
